The Geriatric Psychiatry Clinic (GPC) is a subspecialty within the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Utah. We concentrate on providing outpatient services to adults age 60 and older experiencing a variety of chronic or newly recognized mental health concerns including depression, anxiety, bipolar disorder, addiction, cognitive impairment, dementia and more.

Our multi-disciplinary mission is to:

- increase access to specialized mental health services for older adults.
- combat the stigma of mental illness in the older adult population.
- raise awareness of all the unique health needs of older adults.

The Geriatric Psychiatry Clinic offers age appropriate diagnostic assessment, consultation, treatment, therapy, education for individuals and their caregivers with new and ongoing mental health issues. We work in concert with multi-disciplinary teams that include your primary and specialty care providers. We accept most insurance and Medicare.

GPC understands that there are many challenges that accompany later life including declining overall health, changes in lifestyle or living arrangements, financial stress, social isolation, loss of a loved one or friend, memory loss or impaired thinking skills. Any of these can negatively impact a person's mental and physical health.

We also know that mental health problems are often under-diagnosed by health care professionals, and that stigma about mental health can make people reluctant to seek care. However, mental health and well-being are as important in older adulthood as at any time throughout life.

Financial Elder Justice Needs Assessment

You are invited to participate in a research study by Dr. Alex Schiwal. Dr. Schiwal is a Researcher at the Center for Persons with Disabilities at Utah State University.

The purpose of this survey is to understand the service needs in your community. We want to understand what people know about the Division of Aging and Adults Services (DAAS) and Adult Protective Services (APS).

We also want to know if people understand laws and options around reporting abuse and neglect in Utah. You are being asked to participate in this research because you are an adult community member in Utah.

Your participation in this study is voluntary. You can quit the survey at any time and for any reason.

If you take part in this study, you will be asked to consent to this survey and then you will answer questions on yourself, service needs, and gaps. If you are under 60 and you do not have a physical or mental impairment you will receive a shorter survey. This survey will take 15-20 minutes.

If you are over 60 years old or have a physical or mental impairment, you may be asked about your own experience reporting any abuse you experienced. You will also be asked about your thoughts on the legal needs of vulnerable adults. This survey will take 30-40 minutes. Adults with impairments and those over 65 are covered by APS services. We are asking members of this group more questions.

The possible risks of participating in this study include negative feelings and loss of privacy. You might have negative feelings from questions about possible past abuse. Because you are calling by phone, you may lose some privacy and confidentiality. However, you are being asked to not provide any identifiable information to the person answering the phone. You may skip any questions you prefer not to answer.

You will not directly benefit from this study. However, the information will help DAAS improve the resources they offer in your area.

We will make every effort to ensure that the information you provide remains confidential. We will not reveal your identity in any publications, presentations, or reports resulting from this study. However, it may be possible for someone to recognize the specifics you share with us.

We ask that you do not reveal any personally identifiable information to the person on the phone. You will be provided the contact information for APS throughout the survey, which you must use if you have information to report. If you reveal identifiable instances of unreported abuse, neglect, or exploitation of yourself or a vulnerable adult, the person on the phone becomes a mandatory reporter and must contact APS.

We will collect your data through Qualtrics, a secure online website for entering and storing survey data. Online activities always carry a risk of a data breach. We will use methods to minimize this. Complete data will be stored in a restricted-access folder on Box.com. This is an encrypted, cloud-based storage system.

UTAH STATEWIDE ELDER JUSTICE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Adult Protective Services (APS) operates under the Department of Human Services (DHS) and Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS). APS seeks to understand community awareness about abuse, neglect, and exploitation of vulnerable adults. APS also seeks to identify the services available, gaps in services, and needed resources for this population.

Who is this for?

This survey is for general community members, older adults, adults with disabilities, and caregivers.

What do I have to do?

You can call or go online to take this survey. The online survey is computer and smartphone friendly and offered in multiple languages. The phone survey is offered in English and Spanish. The survey includes basic demographics, identifying service gaps and barriers, knowledge of APS, and legal supports.

How will this information be used?

Survey results will be used to create a plan for the DAAS to improve outcomes for victims of abuse, neglect and exploitation. The plan will also address the need of services and assist with building and improving resources. Kicking Off our Conference Diane Yentel



Diane Yentel is the President and CEO of the National Low Income Housing Coalition, a membership organization dedicated solely to achieving socially just public policy that ensures people with the lowest incomes in the United States have affordable and decent homes. Diane is a veteran affordable housing policy expert with over two decades of work on affordable housing and community development. Before rejoining NLIHC (where she previously worked as a policy analyst), Diane was Vice President of Public Policy and Government Affairs at Enterprise Community Partners, where she led federal, state and local policy, research and advocacy programs. Prior to Enterprise, Diane was the director of the Public Housing Management and Occupancy Division at the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), where she managed a team overseeing the development and implementation of nationwide public housing policies, procedures, and guidelines. She also worked to advance affordable housing policies with Oxfam America and the Massachusetts Coalition for the Homeless and served for 3 years as a community development Peace Corps volunteer in Zambia. Diane is frequently quoted in major media outlets, and has testified multiple times before Congress. Diane has a Masters in Social work from the University of Texas at Austin.

National Low Income Housing Coalition



Across Utah, there is a shortage of rental homes affordable and available to extremely low income households (ELI), whose incomes are at or below the poverty guideline or 30% of their area median income (AMI). Many of these households are severely cost burdened, spending more than half of their income on housing. Severely cost burdened poor households are more likely than other renters to sacrifice other necessities like healthy food and healthcare to pay the rent, and to experience unstable housing situations like evictions.

Workshop Title: Community Reinvestment Act Modernization: OCC Final Rule

At last year's Housing Matters conference, a dynamic panel featured the Community Reinvestment Act Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking issued by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency and Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. It was a fun and interactive session and we promised if the rule became final before this year's conference, we'd be back to discuss it - Well guess what?

On May 20, 2020, the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency *unilaterally* finalized a rule to strengthen and modernize the Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) regulations. The final CRA rule is intended to enable financial institutions to more effectively meet the credit needs of its communities. It becomes effective on October 1, 2020. CRA was enacted in 1977 and the regulatory framework was last updated in 1995. The new OCC final rule, among other things, introduces new assessment areas based on bank's deposit gathering, a qualitative metric to determine ratings, a list of CRA qualifying activities, and new data collection and reporting requirements. The rule also retains from the 1995 version some definitions and processes, such as limited purpose and wholesale designations, use of strategic plans, small and intermediate bank tests, and public disclosure requirements.




Dr. Ivis García, AICP, is an Assistant Professor in City and Metropolitan Planning at the University of Utah. In Utah, she has completed various housing research studies in partnership with the Road Home, Assist Inc., NeighborWorks, and University Neighborhood Partners. Before completing her Ph.D., she worked for the Nathalie P. Voorhees Center where she collaborated with the City of Chicago Housing Trust Fund, the Chicago Rehab Network, and Housing Committees of the Latino Policy Forum and the Puerto Rican Agenda. She also has worked with housing developers to complete a Latino Housing Plan in the West Side of Chicago and rehab housing in Puerto Rico after Hurricanes Irma and Maria. Dr. García was a researcher for the National Low-Income Housing Coalition (NLIHC) in Washington, D.C., and it is currently part of their Disaster Housing Coalition of the NLIHC working in Puerto Rico's recovery.

As an illustration of her intellectual disposition, her most recent theoretical studies have sought to elucidate both current and historic relationships between urban planning, the spatial dynamics of stratification and unequal access, and community development strategies in marginalized and diverse (but primarily Latino) communities.

Troup Howard is an Assistant Professor of Finance at the University of Utah, David Eccles School of Business. His research explores how regional economic outcomes and household finances are affected by the fiscal choices of state and local governments, with particular attention to public debt and taxation.

His recent work has documented [widespread racial and ethnic inequality in property taxation](#); analyzed the common practice of providing corporate tax subsidies as an economic development incentive; shown that unfunded public pension liabilities lead to depressed growth of regional house prices; and estimated how state and local governments adjust spending in response to a severe fiscal shock.



Prior to joining academia, he was a management consultant working with public sector agencies, large NGOs, and cultural institutions. In this capacity he served as an advisor to the Board of Education for a large urban school district, helped a national philanthropic foundation develop and launch a new model for deploying geographically integrated social services within highly underserved communities, and led efforts to expand education opportunities in neighborhood schools by using online learning technologies.

He teaches Introduction to Economics in the MBA program at the Eccles School of Business. He holds a PhD in Finance from the University of California at Berkeley, an MBA from the Kellogg School of Management, and an AB from the University of Chicago.






